## TRANSFER STATION NEWS

New procedures and issuance of NEW Transfer Station stickers are scheduled to begin on Wednesday, October 4<sup>th</sup>.

Stickers will be available at the Transfer Station as well

- Each vehicle entering the property will be required to <u>stop</u> at the guard station or as directed by a staff attendant.
- To be issued a new sticker, Residents will be asked to present proof of residency and identification of their vehicle(s). This will be verified by staff on the Town's Real Estate and/or Motor vehicle lists. This process will be required for each of your vehicles as they are presented at the Transfer Station.
- ALL contractors will be required to submit a copy of their building permit and written verification from the address/residence they are working at.
- All vehicles <u>without</u> a valid sticker or special permit will be requested to leave the premises.

- \* The *Citizen* will be delivered by the 1st of each month (every Ashford mailbox and P.O. box). Copies of the *Citizen* will also be made available in the Ashford Town Offices.

## Important information from the Ashford Registrars of Voters

With the upcoming elections **Tuesday**, **November 7**, **2023**, we want to encourage all citizens and residents of Ashford to register to vote!

Voting will take place at Knowlton Memorial Hall at 25 Pompey Hollow Road Ashford, from 6:00AM until 8:00PM on Tuesday, November 7, 2023.

\*\* You may register at Town Hall during its regular operating hours Monday through Wednesday and Friday in the Town Clerk's Office during regular business hours. Reminder that the Town Hall is closed on Thursdays. The registrars of voters' office hours are on Wednesday from 9:30 AM until 11:30AM.

### Important dates to keep in mind in order to vote for the Tuesday, November 7, 2023:

- \*\* Wednesday, October 6: Absentee ballots are available at Town Hall from the Town Clerk.
- \*\* Tuesday, October 31: We will hold a mandated seventh day before Election Day registration session before the November 7<sup>th</sup> election. We will be conducting office hours between 9:00AM and 8:00PM. Applicants must appear in-person to register.
- \*\* **Tuesday, October 31:** The deadline for registering by mail and on-line. Applications must be hand delivered or post-marked by this date in order to be accepted for the November 7<sup>th</sup> election. Residents may also register to vote online at <a href="https://voterregistration.ct.gov/OLVR/welcome.do">https://voterregistration.ct.gov/OLVR/welcome.do</a>. The on-line voter registration deadline is 11:59p.m.
- \*\* Monday, November 6 from 9:00AM until 5:00 PM: We will hold a limited special registration session for those seeking to vote in the election whose qualifications as to age, citizenship or residence was attained since October 31st.
- \*\* Tuesday, November 7: Election Day Registration "EDR" will take place at Ashford Town Office Building (5 Town Hall Road, Room 304) until 8:00PM. This change to election law was enacted by the General Assembly in Connecticut Public Act 12-56 "An Act Concerning Voting Rights". This act allows eligible people to register to vote in person and cast a ballot on Election Day if he or she meets eligibility requirements for voting and is either (1) not already an elector or (2) is registered in one municipality but wants to change his or her registration because he or she currently in lives in another municipality. A person is eligible to register and vote if he or she is a U.S. citizen, age 18 years or older, and a bona fide resident of the municipality which he or she applies for admission as an elector. Please plan to arrive early in the day as there may be long lines. You will need to provide proof of identity and residency.



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
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# ASHFORD VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT

## The Good News about Heat Pumps

I installed ductless heat pumps, otherwise known as mini-splits, in my 300 year old house about 10 years ago. They have completely cooled and almost completely heated my house since. Once I installed a heat pump water heater about two or three years ago, the solar panels on the roof of my barn have provided for all my electric needs and my electric bill has been \$9.69 each month. I now only buy about 300 gallons of oil a year, whereas before I got the heat pumps, I was filling the 1000 gallon tank two or three times a year (with oil prices what they are, you can imagine the savings!).

You too, can save with heat pumps as well as be more kind to the environment. According to the website, energy gov, an air-source heat pump can deliver up to three times more heat energy to a home than the electrical energy it consumes because it transfers the energy from the air rather than converting it from a fuel, such as oil or gas. Thus, it is both efficient and clean.

When I looked into getting new heating and air conditioning for my house, I wanted to make sure that the system did not disturb the antique quality of the house. Ductless heat pumps only require a three inch hole through the wall to connect the indoor heads to the outdoor condensers. Therefore, little construction was required in the house. I presently have two nice looking narrow condensers in my garden, each connected to three heads in the house. The heads, which sit on an outside wall, are unobtrusive and heat and cool each of the rooms in which they are located very quickly and quietly. I recently learned that even smaller heads can be used and can be located in the ceiling. Energy gov describes how heat pumps work, even in our cooler climate (but which is getting warmer and warmer each year).

These ductless heat pumps are not cheap, but the EnergizeCT website says that both individual and multifamily residences can get up to \$15,000 in incentives for qualifying air source heat pumps. Commercial properties also qualify for these incentives. Additional federal tax credits are available, as well. It definitely makes sense to check into it; I know I've saved a lot of money and you can, too.

Finally, I'd like to put in a plug for choosing a heat pump water heater. My heating bills plummeted when I installed mine and with the incentives I received and which are still available in Connecticut to both residences and commercial properties, it seemed ridiculously inexpensive.




## **Ashford Pollinator Pathway News**

Greetings Ashford! As the leaves start to change & fall, it's once again time to think about cleaning up leaf litter and dead flower stalks in pollinator-friendly ways. Autumn leaf litter is not just a messy layer of debris. Many pollinators seek shelter under the leaves for insulation and protection from winter cold. Decaying leaves support tiny creatures, micro-organisms and fungi which are often a crucial food source for various pollinators in the early spring when other food options are limited. Some native bees and other pollinators have ground nests within the leaf litter, particularly around the base of trees, shrubs and perennials, and disturbing them disrupts their

reproductive cycle. Leaf litter also insulates perennials, helps retain moisture in the soil, releases nutrients that promote healthy soil, and prevent soil erosion.

However, it's also important to maintain a balance because too much leaf litter, particularly of Oak leaves which do not break down easily, can create soggy conditions that smother plants & moss. Ideally the leaf litter should be a thin layer. When removing problematic leaf litter, consider raking or using gentle leaf blowing & pile the leaves elsewhere on your property, rather than using heavy equipment, shredders or burning which will kill the pollinators in the leaf litter. Small leaf piles or undisturbed leaf litter in particular areas on your property can provide pollinators with the nesting sites and shelters they need so you can clean up the rest.

Also consider leaving flower stalks with pithy stems standing, such as Purple Giant Hyssop, Swamp Milkweed, Joe Pyeweed, Purple coneflower, Wild Bergamot to name a few, so that migrating birds can eat the seed heads. You can also cut the stalks of these flowers to varying heights (8-24 inches) so they can be used by stem-nesting bees the following summer (See diagram).

## Plant & Pollinator Spotlight

American Witch-Hazel is a small flowering native tree or shrub, growing 10-20 feet high, found throughout eastern North America. The leaves and bark provide witch hazel, used as a mild astringent to sooth cuts and burns. Its branches have also been used as dowsing sticks in detecting underground water sources. The word "witch" isn't a reference to Harry Potter characters but comes instead from the Old English term "wice" meaning "bendable."



Witch Hazel's crinkly yellow flowers are temperature sensitive & only unfurl on warmer days. It blooms in late fall, sometimes providing final food sources for pollinators as they head into winter. But it can also bloom later in winter when most pollinators have either migrated or hibernated & there is even snow on the ground. Scientists have only recently discovered that late blooming Witch Hazels are often being pollinated by Owlet Moths, also called Winter Moths, who can raise their body temperatures by shivering their wings & fly in search of food even in zero degree temperatures.

We have free Milkweed & Maine Lupine seed packets that need cold stratification to bloom next spring. Email us if you'd like some & instructions on cold stratification (AshfordPollinatorPathways @gmail.com)

  - Treat All Debit Cards As Credit Cards
- 8. Enter Payment information, Review, and Submit.
  - There is a 2.99% fee for Credit and Debit Cards as of June 20, 2023. Minimum fee for Credit and Debit Cards will be \$3.95.
  - There is a \$.95 fee for Checking Account (Reduced from \$1.95)

#### ASSESSOR'S NOTICE TO TAXPAYERS

**DECLARING PERSONAL PROPERTY**: All persons liable to pay taxes are hereby notified to declare all tangible personal property owned by them on October 1, 2023. Non-residents are required to declare property located in any town for any three months preceding October 1, 2023. Assessors mail declaration forms to all property owners previously on record. Failure to receive a form does not negate the requirement to declare. Forms are available online and in the Assessor's Office. Failure to declare by November 1, 2023 will result in a 25% PENALTY assessment.

Taxable personal property includes: unregistered motor vehicles, motor vehicles located in Connecticut but registered in another state, horses and ponies, mobile manufactured homes not assessed as real estate, manufacturing machinery and equipment, business furniture and fixtures, farm machinery, farming tools, mechanics tools, electronic data processing equipment, telecommunication equipment, cables, conduits, pipes, poles, business expensed supplies and other property such as billboards, video games, vending machines, leasehold improvements, etc. Real property and Connecticut registered motor vehicles do not need to be declared.

<u>VETERANS</u> who served for ninety days or more during a time of war or have been disabled must record their honorable discharge with the Town Clerk no later than September 30, 2023 to receive a minimum of 1,000 assessment exemption. Disabled Veterans need to file proof of their VA rating with the Assessor to receive an increased exemption.

<u>ADDITIONAL VETERANS EXEMPTION</u>: Increased exemptions are available for those who meet necessary income requirements and the above Veterans criteria. An application along with proof of income must be filed with the Assessor biennially. Filings for this year must be received in the Assessor's Office no later than October 1, 2023.

<u>ARMED SERVICE MEMBERS</u> may obtain an exemption on one passenger motor vehicle by filing an application with the Assessor.

<u>TOTALLY DISABLED</u>: Any person under the age of 65, eligible to receive permanent total disability payments, must apply by January 31, 2024 to receive a 1,000 assessment exemption. Applicants must furnish proof of award.

**FARM MACHINERY & EQUIPMENT**: Eligible farmers must file the notarized exemption application no later than November 1, 2023.

MANUFACTURING MACHINERY AND EQUIPMENT installed in a manufacturing facility and used in the manufacturing process may be allowed exemption. Eligible manufacturers must complete and file the MME Exemption Application by November 1, 2023.

<u>NEW COMMERCIAL TRUCKS</u> with a gross vehicle rating in excess of 26,000 lbs. should check with the Assessor's office for tax exemption eligibility. Applications must be completed and filed with the Assessor by November 1, 2023.

**LAND CLASSIFICATION**: Persons seeking to classify land under Farm, Forest or Open Space for the first time, or to amend an original filing (ownership, use or acreage) must file between September 1, 2023 and October 31, 2023 with the Assessor. Persons applying for Forest Land classification must also have a PA490 Certified State Forester's Report dated by October 1, 2023.

The Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) began on March 31, 1933 under President Roosevelt's "New Deal" to relieve the poverty and unemployment of the Depression. CCC camps were set up in a few

Connecticut towns, state parks, & forests. Workers built trails, roads, campsites, & dams, stocked fish,

built & maintained fire tower observer's cabins & telephone lines, fought fires, & planted millions of trees. The CCC disbanded in 1942 due to the need for men in WW II.

Enrollees signed up for 6 months and worked a 40-hour week for \$30/mo. The government sent \$25 to the enrollee's family and the enrollee received \$5. The young men received good food, uniforms, and medical care. At first they lived in tents; later they lived in wooden buildings. In nine years, 2.5 million young men participated in restoring public appreciation of the outdoors.

Marty Podskoch is a retired teacher and the author of 11 books: Adirondack Civilian Conservation Corps Camps: Their History, Memories and Legacy of the CCC; Fire Towers of the Catskills: Their History and Lore, Adirondack Fire Towers: Their History and Lore, the Southern Districts; Adirondack Fire Towers: Their History and Lore, the Northern Districts, Adirondack Stories: Historical Sketches; 101 More Adirondack Stories: Historical Sketches; The Adirondack 102 Club: Your Passport & Guide to the North Country. He also writes a weekly column called "Adirondack Stories," in five Adirondack newspapers. He has written three travel books: The Adirondack 102 Club, The Connecticut 169 Club and the Rhode Island 39 Club. Some books will be available to purchase at the event.

#### **Building Update:**

We're looking forward to the delivery of our new generator in November. In October, an automatic switch will be installed to move the power from the street to the generator in the event that we lose power. We continue to work with the insurance company for the rental of our current generator. The roof project continues to move forward. Interviews for the architectural services will be scheduled during the week of October 2- October 9, 2023.

#### **BOE Meetings:**

#### **After School Care Program:**

The BOE has worked in partnership with the Superintendent, Board of Selectmen, Ashford Parks and Recreation Commission, Social/Youth Services, various other Town Departments, personnel and numerous residents to research and develop the plans for an after-school care program for grades K-6. The enrollment in the program has been low.

It was communicated that the fee was challenging for many. Therefore, Mrs. Ford and the first selectman have discussed resources to supplement or offset this cost for this school year. Due to being able to purchase our new reading program with grants and within the budget last year, we were able to reallocate the funds we budgeted for through our ESSER III/ARP grant funding to the after-school program. The after-school care program meets the requirements for social emotional learning and homework support. This was discussed at length during the BOE meeting on September 7, 2023.
